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WOODWORKING RETREAT Karin Matchett



magine engaging with wood and tools for twelve endless days, havingthecompanyofninecurious students and two exceptional instructors, and where the only thing demanding your attention at the end of the day is a campsite along a river in Ontario farm country and a couple of captivating novels. Last July, Irolled into the mill town of Almonte, Ontario, myHondaCivicfilledwithcampinggear, tools, and wood. I came for a two-week course on "Design and Technique" at Rosewood Studio, taught by furnituremakerandwriterGarrettHack.Rosewood Studio is a young school, just beginning its third year. The school's two full-time instructors, Ted Brown and Robert Van Norman, studied with James Krenov at the College of the Redwoods in Fort Bragg, California. Rosewood'semphasis on hand tools and the students' classic workbenches are constant reminders of thecarefulworkmanshipRosewoodvalues and teaches.

Outsidethewindowsbehindthebenches runs Ontario's Mississippi River and above it the train tracks. Inside the shop, we listened, we planed, and we debated. Many of you have read Garrett Hack'sbooks, ClassicHandToolsandThe HandplaneBook. Heisalsoarelaxed and gifted teacher. His approach to design is acombinationofeyeandmind, aesthetics and structure. If hewere a bridge-builder, like my grandfather was, his bridges wouldnotbuckleunderaheavyload.But, unlikemygrandfather'sfurniture,Garrett's pieces don't need to look like they're builttowithstandamarchingarmy.Over the two weeks we began to see how to build furniture strong enough to last for generations of families and weather, but gracefully strong.

Every morning after we'd worked on our ownforan hourorso "toget the jitters out" and clear ourminds, Garrett spentacouple of hours demonstrating a technique or two.

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We discussed the fine points of cutting haunched mortises and tenons, tuning planes, makinginlays, cuttingdovetails, steambendingwoodforchairbacks, and buildingdrawersanddrawercasings. For mostoftheafternoonwepuzzledoverand laboredawayatourprojects. Theyshooed usoutoftheworkshopat6:00or7:00p.m., only to have us reappear on the steps at 7:00 the next morning, coffee mugs and experimentalsketchesofdovetailsinhand.

Many students came with specific ideas or even full-blown plans for the piece of furniture they hoped to build. A few wereundecidedbutweresooninundated withideas. Iwas committed to building a writingtable. Tables attract my attention likenootherobject, in part because I love and respect what we use them for -eating and writing. This table I knew needed a drawer.Ididn'tknowhowtomakedrawers andknewRosewoodwastheidealplaceto learn.Insteadofdimensioningthelumber first, webegan by bands awing the project pieces out of rough lumber. We ran the piecesoverthejointerandplaner, and from there it was the job of planes and chisels to cut the joinery, shape the curves, and finish the surfaces.

I chose Rosewood in general, and this course in particular, largely because of the emphasis on hand tools and the accompanying attention given to furnituredesign (and also because Igo to CanadaeverychanceIget). When Ibegan woodworking, the instruction that lavailed myself of never departed from powered tools and very little attention was given tofurnituredesign. At the time, it was all Ihad time for and I gladly took it in. But I knewIneeded a different sort of teacher and school, and when I suddenly had time this pastyear, almost without thinking I began searching for new teachers. I had also left my house in south Minneapolis anditspotentialhugeworkshopspaceand am living temporarily in a one-bedroom apartmentinConnecticutwithnospace for table saw, jointer, etc.-hand tools just made sense. Then when I made my first plane shaving and saw what sharp tools do, I knew what direction I needed to take. At Rosewood the instructors emphasizeboth hand and power toolsloved in that order, used in the reverse. Amazingly, I think, at Rosewood they so far seem to have avoided dichotomies andtheegoissuesthatsometimesinfuse attitudes toward one or the other type of tool. We each had our beautiful bench (built on site), had the run of two wellequippedmachinerooms, and used hand and powered tools as we wished. Itended toward the philosophies of Garrett and, perhaps more so, of Rosewood instructor Robert Van Norman who constructs many of his own tools.

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
While Garrett directed the course, many of us soon discovered what Robert also offered, as a perceptive, gifted, and patient

furniture builder and teacher. Robert lent me a handmade compass plane for shaping the curve of my table legs. He made this plane when building a double rockingchair;thecurveoftheplane'ssole exactlymatchedthecurveoftherockers. After spending a day making the plane, hereportedlymadetwopasseswithiton eachrockerandtheywerereadytofinish. Thestabilityofthehandmadewoodplane and the thin shaving it cut surprised me, enough to enroll in a week-long class on making spokeshaves, planes, and chisels. Next summer, Iplan to make the second annual trek north to Ontario to joinseveralinitialstrangersdrawnalsoto thetoolsandattentivepaceofRosewood. I'll trade months of fitting wood into a hecticscheduleforthefulldaysofanother woodworking retreat.
